Administration's Manufactured CFAP Expansion Delay Tactics Exposed

What does CFAP Expansion do? It simplifies the CFAP program. Today county workers must verify the applicant's immigration status. Under CFAP expansion there is no need to verify immigration status.

75,000 Senior Californians who do not have a CFAP required immigration status are denied CalFresh benefits and endure food insecurity even though they have paid millions of dollars into the California tax chaffers over the years.

On 7-16-21 the Governor signed AB 135, Statutes of 2021, Sections 86 and 87 – CFAP Expanded effective 6-30-22. A similar provision was included in the FY 22-23 budget trailer bill SB 187 – Statutes of 2022, Section 84- CFAP Expended. It is now 2023 and the FY 23-24 Governor's budget proposes to delay the implementation until 2027.

The administration's delay tactics while thousands of tax paying and tax paid aged, blind and disabled immigrants endure food insecurity is callous.

ADMINISTRATON DELAY TACTIC #1.

Need approval from FNS to do CFAP expansion – Was this done in 2021? 2022? Is the Biden Administration being blamed for California's immigrant food insecurity?

ADMINISTRATON DELAY TACTIC # 2.

Case Codes R6/R9 WINS CFAP? Current Aid Code is R-3 New Aid Code S1 for TCVAP & S2 for CFAP Expansion. What's wrong with R3?

ADMINISTRATON DELAY TACTIC # 3.

Force People in Mixed Households to opt in rather than opting out – creating barriers to participation.

ADMINISTRATON DELAY TACTIC # 4.

Create New Policies that are not needed

ADMINISTRATON DELAY TACTIC # 5.

Create new CFAP Expansion Notices of Actions when there is no need for new notices. The current notices can work fine.

ADMINISTRATON DELAY TACTIC #6.

Automation – 24-months – CalSAWS and CWDA have publicly stated that they can automate this by 1-1-24.
